Bountiful's Spring Clean Up

Spring clean up is April 5-9. During that week on your regular garbage pickup day, City crews will also remove trash and refuse which has been properly bundled, bagged or boxed. Limbs and trees must be cut in five-foot lengths, bundled and tied with twine. Each bundle, bag or box must not exceed 50 pounds. Please separate metal items from your other debris as metal recycling crews will be picking up those items. Concrete and construction materials will not be picked up curb side. All items, including old furniture or appliances, should be placed on the drive approach or park strip, not on the street or sidewalk. Please note that spring clean up items will be picked up by different clean up crews at different times or on days other than your regular

garbage day, so all of your clean up items may not be picked up at the same time. Please have your clean up items out for

crews to pick up before 7:00 a.m. on your regular garbage day.

To assist you in your spring clean up, the landfill will not charge Bountiful resi-

dents a fee during spring clean up week or the following week (proof of residency is required). Trash that does not comply with the above restrictions can be taken to the landfill and disposed of at no charge April 5-17 during regular landfill hours. Landfill fees will still be in place for concrete and construction materials during the clean up free weeks. We do not accept hazardous materials, propane tanks or tires of any kind during the clean up week or at the landfill.

Garbage containers should be placed at the curb before 7:00 a.m. on vour regular pickup day. Lids must be closed when put out for collection.

Landfill Summer hours are in effect April 1 through October 31 and are Monday through Saturday from 8:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.; closed Sunday & Holidays (see www.bountifulutah.gov/Landfill for the holiday schedule). Vehicles must be out by closing, so please plan accordingly. Please separate recyclable items and place them in the proper areas at the landfill.

Compost is available at the landfill for spring gardening which increases water retention in your soil. The cost is \$35 per ton.

Power Department Signs Solar Power Contracts

n its continuing search to improve \perp and expand its power supply, the Power Department has signed two 25-year contracts to receive solar power from the Red Mesa Tapaha Solar Project and the Steel Solar, LLC Project at an average blended cost of 3.067 cents per KWH over the life of the two contracts. This is comparable to installing solar panels on approximately 1,220 homes in the City. By 2022, the City's power resources will be 50% carbon free, including our existing hydro resources and the two new solar projects.

HOPE BEGINS HERE

The Bountiful Community Food Pantry provides much needed support to children, seniors and families across Davis County by distributing over two million pounds of food each year. Bountiful residents and others donated an amazing 445,027 pounds of food in November and December of 2020—up almost 200,000 pounds from 2019 during the same months! Thank you!

The Pantry serves 900 families and 11,000 hungry students each month, and has many opportunities for you to help! They are hopeful that the Feed Utah Food Drive (March 20) and the Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive (May 8] will happen this year, but if they are cancelled, they will definitely need everyone's continued support keeping their shelves stocked. Items such as peanut butter, canned meats & cereal are always needed, but you can also check their Facebook page [www.facebook.com/BountifulFoodPantry—make sure you "Like" it!] or their website [www.bountifulfoodpantry.org] to stay informed of the current most-needed items.

The Pantry is always looking for regular volunteers who are interested in committing to two to five hours a week to help with Grocery Rescue, assisting in the pantry or sorting and stocking in the warehouse. In November 2010, the Power Department (BCLP) borrowed \$15,280,000 in a 20-year loan (the 2010 Bond) to help fund a major upgrade of its power plant in Bountiful. This upgrade included removing facilities, most of which had been built in the 1950s, building a new dispatch center, generation buildings and facilities, and installing two new natural gas-fired turbines, which produce approximately 12.5 megawatts (MW) each. This increased the generating capability to 32.3 MWs, about four times the previous generating capacity.

This upgrade was done to increase BCLP's total available power generation while significantly reducing total emissions. It also increased the ability to generate power when it is needed based on daily weather and load variations. With the ability to generate its own power, BCLP can choose to purchase power from power markets when prices are low or generate power when market prices are too high. Having this option helps to stabilize and reduce power costs for the City and for its customers.

For the last 10 years, BCLP has paid approximately \$1.2 million per year in principal and interest on the 2010 Bond. In addition, BCLP maintained an "AA-" rating (a strong industry rating) for its 2010 Bond as determined by both the Standard & Poors and Fitch Ratings bond rating agencies.

In November 2020, BCLP paid off the remaining \$9,350,000 2010 Bond principal balance. BCLP has no other long-term debt and has no current plans to take on additional debt.

Did you know?

There is a medication disposal receptacle in the lobby of the Bountiful Police Department located at 805 South Main Street. The lobby is open 24/7 so you can safely get rid of any medication you no longer need any time.

City Project Updates

orth Canyon Trailhead

The Bountiful City Trails Master Plan (TMP) identifies North Canyon as a key connection point in the City's trail system and the need for a single-track and trailhead/parking area to be installed at the end of Canyon Creek Drive. With the help of a grant from Davis County, the City will be able to complete the project by approximately June 2022, construct a mile-long singletrack trail, and grade and pave the trailhead/parking area. This is an exciting project!

Eagle Ridge Drive

It has been long anticipated that Eagle Ridge Drive, a road that currently ends at about the Bountiful "B", would be extended south to intersect with Bountiful Boulevard, giving residents in that area another way in and out of their neighborhood along with other benefits. Bountiful City has partnered with Davis County and Custom Enterprises, owners of the much of the land the road crosses, to finally complete the road extension this summer.

Free and Reduced Priced Meals
