

Questions to Consider

- What do you think about how this was made?
- Having read the artist statement, what does it make you think of?
- Each piece is different, what is unique about this piece?
- Why do you think the artist chose this subject matter?
- As you look at the piece from different angles and light, what do you notice?
- Do you like it or dislike it?
 - Any art piece will have differing opinions depending on personal life perspectives. It's ok not to like it. One may love it while another may strongly dislike it, or one may not have a strong opinion in either direction. However, with any opinion, there must be respect for the artist who made it.
