2009-10 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

The Bountiful City Council, at their May 12 Council meeting, tentatively adopted a budget of \$55,504,948 for next fiscal year. This 2009-10 tentative budget is down \$5,069,343 from the current year (2008-09) budget. The City's fiscal year begins July 1, and goes to June 30, similar to the fiscal year of the State of Utah and the Davis County School District.

The 2009-10 budget includes no increase in taxes or utility rates, and even with the decreased revenue and expense, is balanced with regard to revenues and expenses as required by state law.

Half of the budget, or \$28,000,000, is budgeted for expenses in the Power Department. There is no increase in electrical rates, and Bountiful's property taxes, electrical rates, water rates , garbage rates and sewer rates will still be the lowest of any city in Davis County, and among the lowest in the state of Utah.

The economic downturn has affected Bountiful, just as it has affected the national and state economies. Local sales tax revenues are down over the current year, as car sales and discretionary purchases have decreased due to citizens becoming more cautious and circumspect in their buying habits. What is not known is how long the economic downturn will persist, and if it will in fact go deeper than the city, state and nation are currently experiencing. The 2009-10 budget is based on the economic recovery not occurring until after the 2009-10 fiscal year, but not deteriorating further.

The Bountiful Mayor and City Council strongly believed, as the budget was being prepared, that the City should live within its means and not attempt to balance the budget on the backs of the taxpayers. As a result, this budget includes no cost of living adjustment and increased cost of medical insurance for City employees. It also includes elimination of both full-time and part-time positions in order to balance the budget.

In spite of these reductions, every effort has been made to maintain Bountiful's high level of service delivered to the taxpayer in the field. While closure of City Hall on Fridays is probable, the City offices will still be open from 7:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. Monday though Thursday. Maintenance of the roads, parks, water lines, and power system will continue so that the City's infrastructure is kept current. The largest single capital project is reconstruction of the City's main power substation, located just under the high voltage lines next to the Great Salt Lake, which serve the entire state of Utah. The \$1.5 million improvement project will increase reliability and redundancy at the substation. The next largest capi-

tal project is the reconstruction of 500 South from 200 West to 400 West. This project includes improved storm drainage, construction of handicap ramps at each of the intersections, and the grinding of the current roadway surface and installation of a brand new road surface for all lanes of traffic.

The budget does not in-

clude any costs of potential federal legislation being considered by Congress this year. For example, a proposed "cap and trade" program, if it has a carbon tax associated with it, could significantly increase electric rates to our citizens. Should that legislation be approved, electrical rates would have to be increased accordingly. We are hopeful that Congress does not implement a carbon tax, not because we are against environmental improvement, but because the tax is nothing more than a revenue raising mechanism for the Federal Government. Next year's power supply projections show that Bountiful's portion of renewable energy is 38%.

The 2009-10 budget reflects a concerted effort by the City staff and the Mayor and Council to reduce expenses where possible and necessary to achieve a balanced budget without increasing taxes, fees, rates or charges. Our City employees have been partners with us in that effort, and will be taking effective decreases in compensation to meet this goal. The tentative budget adopted by the Council will be up for public hearing on June 9th at 7:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers. PRESERVING A SAFE PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY

s residents and property owners in Bountiful, A we share a responsibility to maintain not only our property, but also the land between our property line and the street, which is the public right-of-way. In most areas, the public right-ofway includes a parkstrip and sidewalk. If there is not a sidewalk, it is measured from the back of the curb to the owners' property line, which is typically 8 to 10 feet wide.

Landowners and occupants of property adjacent to a public street need to keep this area clear of obstacles and debris. Tree branches need to be trimmed to provide a seven-foot high clearance for pedestrian access, even if there is not a sidewalk. Signs, walls, and other items not authorized by Bountiful City are illegal in public rights-of-way. Sidewalks should be kept in good condition and clear from snow, ice and other obstructions. Please report immediately to the City Engineering department any sidewalk, curb, or parkstrip that is unlevel, dangerous, or otherwise out of repair. (See contact information to the right and at www.bountifulutah.gov).

Xeriscaping in parkstrips located within the public right-of-way is also allowed. For more information on xeriscaping requirements, or for other Land Use Ordinances, visit our website at www.bountifulutah.gov, click on "Departments", then "Planning & Zoning", and scroll down to view the Ordinances by chapter. SPRING HAS SPRUNG IN BOUNTIFUL!

ave you ever wondered how Bountiful City's gardens grow? All those beautiful plants and flowers are grown in two greenhouses owned and operated by Bountiful City (see front page photo)!

The whole process begins in the fall when tender plants are dug, divided and stored or nurtured through winter. In December, seeding begins for the annual flowers. Seeding and transplanting is usually completed for all 70,000 plants during April, and most flowers are ready to be transplanted outside during

May.

It usually takes three to four weeks to get all 96 flower beds throughout the city planted, following designs that are put together in the fall. It's no wonder Bountiful is know as the City of Beautiful Homes and Gardens!

KEEP COOL IN THE SUMMER WITH THESE A/C TIPS

S ummer is just around the corner! Now is the time to make sure your air conditioner is ready to handle those hot summer days. Here is a checklist of things to help improve its efficiency:

- Clean or replace the air filter monthly. A clean air filter can reduce energy consumption from 5% to 15%.
- Keep the area around your air conditioner clear. When you mow your lawn, avoid blowing any grass trimmings toward your air conditioner.
- Occasionally rinse your outdoor air conditioning unit by gently running a stream of water over the fan blades to rinse off dirt and other sediments.
- Locate your outdoor air conditioner unit in a shaded place if possible, since air in a shaded space is typically 5 or 6 degrees cooler than unshaded air.

- Insulate all ductwork, especially in the attic. You don't want to be cooling your attic space!
- Keep room vents uncovered by beds, furniture, and other objects.
- Inspect the weather-stripping around your doors and windows and replace as needed.
- Keep windows, doors, and fireplace dampers completely closed to keep cooled air inside.
- Direct the cool air to upper floors by closing basement vents and doors.
- Do your laundry and use your oven in the early morning or late evening; this will keep your home cooler during the day when the outdoor temperature is typically at its warmest.

Don't wait until it is scorching outside! Preparing your air conditioner and home for summer will help you stay cooler and reduce energy costs!
