BOUNTIFUL'S HISTORY—DID YOU KNOW. . .?

ith a population of 42,898 citizens (2012), Bountiful is considered by the Utah Municipal Code as a third class city—defined as a city that has a population of between 30,000 and 65,000?

...Bountiful was originally known as "Session's Settlement" and only the second settlement in Utah? Perrigrine Sessions and his family moved to Bountiful on September 27, 1847, and were the only residents in the area until the spring

of 1848. They lived in a dugout he constructed with skins for a roof that was located at approximately 250 North 280 West. By the end of 1848, his family had been joined by about 60 others. On February 17, 1855, the name Bountiful was unanimously accepted

by those living in the community.

...Holbrook elementary school in Bountiful is named after the first teacher here? The first "school" was constructed of bulrushes and clay on the banks of the Jordan River in the fall of 1848, and Hannah Holbrook taught the children of the settlement there. In November of 1849, the citizens voted to build a school house and John C.L. Smith was hired to teach for a salary of \$30 per month.

...Bountiful's downtown is sometimes referred to as the "Fort Area"? In 1855, citizens voted to build a wall made of mud and straw for protection. The wall was three miles long, eight feet high, and four feet thick at the top. It went

along what is now 400 North, 200 West, 500 South and 400 East. $\,$

...the Tabernacle on Main and Center Streets in Bountiful is the oldest, continuously used LDS church building anywhere? It was dedicated by Brigham Young in 1863 after six years of construction.

...Bountiful has had 29 Mayors since its incorporation in 1892? The first Mayor was Joseph L. Holbrook (pictured at the top left in

Mayor's Row). Elected to the first City Council were Edwin Pace, Thomas Briggs, Stearns Hatch, J.L. Fackrell and Arthur Riley. Joseph T. Mabey was the City Marshall, R.E. Egan the City Recorder and Jed Stringham was Treasurer. Earnest Madsen and J.A. Taylor

each served as mayor two times—once appointed when a mayor resigned, and once elected.

...there were no house numbers used in Bountiful until 1940?

...two of Utah's governors were from Bountiful? Charles R. Mabey, who served as Mayor of Bountiful from 1912-13, was elected governor of Utah in 1920. Calvin Rampton, also a Bountiful native, became Utah's governor 45 years later in 1965.

...electric lights came to Bountiful in 1907 through the efforts of Bountiful citizens. The system was purchased by the City which has continually kept utility rates low.




WELCOME BACK: BAR J WRANGLERS ARE A-COMIN' TO TOWN

DO NOT FEED THE DEER!

he Bountiful City Council recently approved an ordinance prohibiting the feeding of deer within Bountiful city limits. The City Council found that there are so many urban deer within the city limits that they pose a threat to the safety of people and property and constitute a public nuisance. The ordinance is authorized by Section 10-8-60 of the Utah Code wherein the declaration of a public nuisance and steps to abate it are outlined. Prohibiting the feeding of deer is a means by which their presence will be discouraged and will provide for public safety, promote the peace, good order, comfort and convenience of the City and its inhabitants for the protection of property.

Property owners are asked to remove any materials (fruit, grain, mineral, salt, vegetable, or other material placed outdoors for consumption by deer) placed on the owner's property for the purpose of feeding deer, elk or moose. Failure to

remove such materials within 24 hours of notice from the City shall constitute a class C misdemeanor. This ordinance does not apply to naturally

growing vegetation, or to planted vegetation growing in yards, gardens or beds.

The Bountiful Community Food Pantry has several ways that you can help others during the holiday season. This pantry serves 1,000+ families each month who live in southern Davis County. Needs at this time

include families or groups to participate in the Subfor-Santa program in December, turkey donations in early November, general food donations, financial donations, schools/businesses/churches to host food drives and individuals to fill selected volunteer openings including helping at the loading dock receiving food/financial donations and answering phones during the holiday season.

In the last 12 months the pantry has distributed over 2 million pounds of food, provided services 17,000+ times to 50,136 individuals and helped countless individuals find jobs and move out of crisis mode. All of this is done with only two fulltime employees, one part-time employee and countless regularly scheduled volunteers. STORM DRAIN AND FLOOD HAZARD INFORMATION

torm water is rain that flows from rooftops, yards, driveways, etc. It picks up dirt, grass

its path, and these pollutants are carried by the storm water into the storm drains and down into local streams and wetlands - untreated. Remember to help keep pollutants from getting into our streams. Do not place dirt, chemicals or other polluting or hazardous materials in

gutters where they can be washed into the storm drain. A fine may be issued to anyone placing dirt, mulch, gravel, etc. in City gutters or streets.

FLOOD HAZARD INFORMATION

The US Congress has mandated all federally insured lenders to require flood insurance on

properties that are located in "Special Flood Hazard Areas" which are those areas determined to have a clippings, pesticides, or other materials that are in $\,$ 1% or greater chance of flooding in any given

year. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) issues maps known as Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM), to help determine the flood risks for real property. The Bountiful City Engineering Department can assist inquirers about flood insurance, flood zones, and flood

protection for specific properties. FIRMs can also be viewed on the internet using FEMA's Map Service http://www.fema.gov/national-flood-Center: insurance-program/map-service-center.

Those having questions about flood hazards or storm drain pollution should contact the Engineering Department at City Hall, 801.298.6125.

BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWAL

Bountiful BUSINESS OWNERS....don't forget to renew your business license EARLY for 2015. If you have not yet received a renewal notice in the mail, you will soon. The deadline for renewal with-

out penalty is February 14, 2015. Penalties of 50% of the total license fee will incur after that date until the end of March, and 100% of total license fee if paid after March 31, 2015.

Renew your business license by coming to the Planning and Zoning Department at City Hall or via mail to 790 South 100 East. Both Home and Commercial

WINTER IS COMING—SOME REMINDERS FOR OUR RESIDENTS!

t's that time of year when the City's winter parking ordinance goes into effect. In an effort to help our Street Department continue doing such an excellent job clearing the snow from the road-

ways, we are asking for your cooperation in not parking your vehicles on the street when prohibited as outlined below. Bountiful City Parking Ordinance § 13-1-103 states:

> "It is unlawful for any person who owns or has possession, custody, or control of any vehicle to park or allow to be parked any vehicle or trailer on any street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. during the months of November, December, January, February and March."

The ordinance also prohibits parking vehicles on the street when it is actually snowing, or within twelve hours thereafter. This prohibition does not include Main Street between 500 South and 400 North. Officers will be putting warnings on vehicles left parked on the street for the first two weeks of November. After that, officers will begin issuing parking citations on all vehicles that are left on the street in violation of this ordinance

SNOW REMOVAL

The Bountiful City Code was recently amended to clarify that property owners are responsible for removing snow on all sidewalks abutting their property; this includes corner lots, and properties that back onto public streets. Shoveling snow and ice from your sidewalks within 24 hours of a storm is important for the safety of residents-particularly to prevent slips and falls. Open sidewalks also keep our citizens from walking in the road during the winter months, which also increases their safety. And remember to not defeat the efforts of our snow plow drivers by shoveling or blowing snow into the street. It is dangerous and illegal!

HOLIDAY GARBAGE PICK UP

If your garbage day falls on or is after Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, or New Years Day, your garbage day and the remaining week's pick up will be delayed by one day, with Friday's garbage being picked up on Saturday. FOR ALL OTHER HOLIDAYS, GARBAGE IS PICKED UP ON YOUR NORMAL GARBAGE DAY!
