2020 Windstorm—a debrief

September 7 and 8 will go down in history as another major event to add to long list of 2020 life-altering happenings. Like the 2011 windstorm, the windstorm of 2020 destroyed trees and fences, tossed trampolines and blew away garbage cans. Unlike the 2011 storm, leaves were still on the trees and the ground was still moist from watering. This seemed to account for the larger number and different kinds of downed trees, and the greater amount of destruction to power lines and other infra-

structure.

With 10 green debris collection sites located throughout the City, things were cleaned up relatively quickly and residents were able to avoid long lines

at the Landfill.

Bountiful City is very grateful to all those that helped in any way- residents who stepped up to help neighbors, other cities who offered services and equipment, the Utah National Guard, the workers spending 18 hour days getting power back on, the local businesses who donated food to feed them and our Bountiful Community Service Council volunteers who answered your calls and got your information to the right place.

Storm Drain and Flood Hazard Information

ater pollution from nutrients is one of America's most widespread and challenging environmental problems caused by excess nitrogen and phosphorus



(often from fertilizer use and pet waste) in the water. These natural elements support the growth of plants and algae, but when

in excess, the water becomes polluted. Excess nitrogen and phosphorus lead to algal blooms, low oxygen and the production of toxins in the water. Nutrient pollution has impacted many streams, lakes, and even groundwater sources, including many here in Utah.

Fertilizer can enter local creeks by running down the curb and gutter into the storm drain system which drains directly into the creeks. The following practices can help prevent fertilizers from entering our public surface waters:

- Reduce the need for fertilizer by leaving mulched grass clippings on lawn areas to recycle nutrients
- Follow manufacturer's recommendations on fertilizer application to avoid leaching of fertilizer with sprinkler water runoff (avoid over-application)
- Never wash fertilizer spills (or any material) down onto the streets or curb and gutter
- Sweep or blow any overspread of fertilizer onto landscape areas

Washing of any material down the gutter and into the storm drain is prohibited and should be reported by calling 801.525.5100.

FLOOD HAZARD INFORMATION

The US Congress has mandated all federally insured lenders to require flood insurance on properties that are located in "Special Flood Hazard Areas" which are those areas determined to have a 1% or greater chance of flooding in any given year. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) issues maps

known as Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs), to help determine the flood risks for real property. FIRMs can be viewed on the internet using FEMA's Map Service Center: https://msc.fema.gov/portal/ search The Bountiful City Engineering Department can assist inquirers about flood insurance and flood information for



specific properties as follows: the flood zone, whether property is in a "floodway", flood depth (where information is available), flood-related hazards, natural floodplain functions, historic

flood information and flood protection measures. Engineering staff can also do site visits and give recommendations for flood protection. Copies of FEMA Elevation Certificates are available for some of the properties. A brochure about Utah floods is also available.

Business Licenses

DID YOU KNOW you need a business license if

you are running a business out of your home or opening a new store or restaurant at a commer-



cial location? Come to the Planning and Zoning Department, temporarily located at 150 North Main Street, Suite 103, to apply for a business license. Both home and commercial business licenses are valid January 1 through December 31. Windstorm Stats:

- 49 power poles were replaced in five days - average annual replacement is 112
- 7-8,000 feet of powerlines were installed/replaced
- Approximately 4,600 man hours were worked during the five days of the outage.
- About 60,000 cubic yards of green waste was collected from the windstorm - enough to fill over 18 Olympic-sized pools or a football field piled nearly 10 feet deep.

Winter Reminders!

It's that time of year again when the City's winter parking ordinance goes into effect. In an effort to help our Streets Department continue to do such an excel-

lent job clearing the snow from the roadways, we are asking for your cooperation in not parking your vehicles on the street when prohibited as described in Bountiful City Code §13-1-103:

"It is unlawful for any person who owns or has possession, custody, or control of any vehicle to park or allow to be parked any vehicle or trailer on any street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. during the months of November, December, January, February, and March."

Parking vehicles on the street when it is actually snowing, or within twelve hours thereafter is also prohibited by this ordinance. This prohibition does

not include Main Street between 500 South and 400 North.

This ordinance assists the Streets Department in keeping the streets plowed during the winter months. The Police Department will enforce this ordinance by putting warnings on vehicles left parked on the street for the first two weeks of November. After that, officers will begin issuing parking citations on all vehicles that are left

on the street in violation of this ordinance. After the same vehicle has been issued two parking citations, that vehicle will be impounded at the owner's expense. This includes all cars, trailers, boats, etc.

SIDEWALK SNOW REMOVAL

Bountiful City Code §6-2-116 states that property owners are responsible

for removing snow on all sidewalks abutting their property. This includes corner lots and properties that back onto public streets. Shoveling snow and ice from



your sidewalks within 24 hours of a storm is important for the safety of residents. It is also illegal to shovel or blow snow into the street—it defeats the efforts of our snow plow drivers.

HOLIDAY GARBAGE PICKUP

If your garbage/recycling day falls on Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day or New Year's Day, your garbage day and the remaining week's pick up will be delayed by one day, with Friday's garbage being picked up on Saturday. For all other holidays, garbage/recycling is picked up on your regular garbage/recycling day!
