Every day we see individuals, families and businesses being creative and innovative. We are learning to adjust and make the most of our situation. The stories we hear are inspiring, such as young musicians entertaining the most vulnerable from the sidewalk. Positive people around the world are immersed in doing good. Why would we want to go all the way back to "normal"? I am seeing love, forgiveness and selflessness winning the day-every day.

We ache for those whose lives are forever



changed by the virus, but we are also inspired by individuals, families and businesses who are showing us how to live differently than before COVID-19. 



Bountiful City Reminders—cross connections, weeds and signs!

CROSS CONNECTIONS—It is a violation of State Law to interconnect culinary and secondary water supplies, as it can result in the contamination of the public water supply. A **cross connection** is any actual or potential arrangement between a public or consumer's culinary water system and any other source or system that may potentially introduce chemicals, fertilizers or untreated water into the potable water system. Here are some examples of how cross connection/backflow can happen:

- **Backpressure** happens when the pressure of the contaminant source exceeds the positive pressure in the water distribution main.
- Backsiphonage is caused by a negative pressure (vacuum or partial vacuum) in the water distribution system.



WEEDS—The sun is now shining and the warmer weather brings new growth throughout the City, including **weeds**. As a reminder please ensure all weeds on your property are trimmed below six inches and not allowed to accumulate. Also, please remember any dead or dying vegetation should be removed from your property.

SIGNS—If you are a business owner wanting to update or add signage to your property, please remember all signs, including temporary signs, require a **sign permit**.
