WHAT MAKES BOUNTIFUL UNIQUE?

s Mayor of Bountiful, I often get asked what makes Bountiful different than other cities throughout the county and the state. There are several different things that I think make Bountiful better, and I would like to share a few of those with you.

To begin with, our citizens are highly committed and engaged in the betterment of our community. In surveys that we have done, nearly 90% of Bountiful residents have

lived in Bountiful for over 10 years, and plan to be in Bountiful for at least 10 more years. Many residents have lived here their entire life, and some even multi-generational have ties to Bountiful. This longevity contributes to a sense of community and a commitment to make the

community better. It is reflected not only in the way that Bountiful citizens keep up their private property (we are known as the City of Beautiful Homes and Gardens), but also in getting to know our neighbors and helping each other out, committing to volunteer at schools, churches, and other community organizations, joining and participating in service clubs, and doing a variety of other activities that make Bountiful better each year. When people have a long term commitment to a community, they want it to be safe, clean, compassionate, beautiful, wholesome and modern. They want cultural and educational opportunities as well as recreational opportunities. They form a strong fabric within neighborhoods which goes well beyond simply a community watch program. They volunteer to help out with the community food pantry, the seasonal clean ups and the neighborhood improvement projects. In summary, the citizens of Bountiful, and their commitment to the City, make the City different than almost any other city in the state. Bountiful is, in essence, a large "small town."

Another thing that makes Bountiful different is an absolute commitment by City

employees to providing high services to its citizens at low cost. As a result, Bountiful citizens enjoy the lowest property tax rate of any major city in the state. Its citizens enjoy the lowest utility rates. Every job Bountiful City employees are involved in, from operating and maintaining the award-winning golf course, the beautiful cemetery, the streets and roads, the water system, the power system, to providing police, fire and other pub-

lic safety services, are done with the goal of providing absolutely the best value of any city in the state. We care not only about how fast our response time is, but also what we do once we arrive at the scene to resolve and solve the problem or crisis. We don't stop snow plow-

ing until the road is clear, even if it means going over the same section of road 10 times during a storm that may last a day and a half. It means paying attention to environmental, technical, engineering, financial and other regulatory details to keep Bountiful compliant with the myriad laws and regulations.

Finally, there is a unique partnership between Bountiful and its citizens. There is a feeling that we are "all in this together" and that City employees will honor the trust given them from an operational and fiduciary standpoint and the citizens will do whatever they can to make sure that the community's citizens - particularly the seniors and schoolage - receive support, help and assistance as needed. Where necessary and possible, partnerships between the public sector and the private sector, between the city and its citizens, are developed and implemented with the goal of preventing problems before they occur or solving problems that are currently there, working toward the success of all of its citizens.

During this Thanksgiving time of year, I am extremely grateful and proud to be a citizen of Bountiful.

POWER PLANT UPDATE

ver the past year Bountiful City Light & Power (BCLP) has been making major renovations to its power plant to increase BCLP's generation capacity.

BCLP currently has to rely on the open power market to cover peak power needs during the summer months. Increasing BCLP's generation capacity will give the BCLP more flexibility to cover these summer peaks.

The first phase of the power plant upgrade was completed in September 📟

of this year by Interwest Construction and included construction of a dispatch center, communications room, utility rooms, storage rooms, and a workshop. The new dispatch

center will be more user-friendly than the old one and will help BCLP to guickly restore power during power outages.

> The next phase of the project, awarded to Big -D Construction, is underway. The center section of the old power plant has been demolished and construction of a new building to house the two new natural gas fire turbine generators has begun.

> The project is scheduled to be completed

by the summer of 2012 and is located on the east side of 200 West, between 200 South and 300 South in Bountiful.

- lways check for overhead power lines before stringing outdoor lights. Never place yourself or any object in a position where you or the object may come in contact with a power line - the result may be fatal. Look up before using ladders or other objects and stay at least 10 feet away from overhead lines.
- Use lights and extension cords designed

for outdoor use if placing them outside.

- Use only lighting and cords approved by the Underwriters Laboratories (UL), an independent, nonprofit organization that tests electrical components and equipment for potential hazards.
- When hanging lights, make sure that nails and staples do not pierce or pinch wires.

- Check all indoor and outdoor decorative lighting for frayed cords, broken wires and loose connections. Discard damaged lights and cords.
- Follow the manufacturer's specification for the number of light strings that can be safely connected together.
- Turn off indoor and outdoor decorative lights when leaving the house and before

going to bed.

Consider using LED holiday lighting. Most LED lights are shatter and shock resistant, and last much longer than conventional incandescent bulbs. They produce almost no heat, which greatly reduces the risk of fire and makes them safer to touch. LEDs use much less electricity than conventional incandescent bulbs and are less likely to overload a circuit.

Many children walk on the sidewalks to and from school. Joggers and other pedestrians also use the sidewalks on a daily basis, even in the winter. Those who rely on public transit depend on a clear path to make their commute safe. When pedestrians are

forced to step into the street to avoid snow and ice, they become a traffic hazard. In the winter, driving is difficult enough without having to look out for people walking in the street because of unclear sidewalks.

Putting Snow into the Street

 \bigotimes Remove snow from the sidewalks adjacent to Do not blow or shovel snow off your driveway or sidewalk into the street. (City Ord. §6-2-115)

> When residents shovel or blow the snow from their driveways or the sidewalks into the street it defeats the efforts of the plow drivers. Residents usually get to their driveways and sidewalks after the plows have cleared the street.

Snow blown or shoveled into the street becomes a danger to motorists who believe the road is clear and who are not watching for patches of slush and ice that have been thrown onto the street.

WINTER PARKING IN BOUNTIFUL



It's that time of year again when the city's winter parking ordinance goes into effect. In an effort to help our street department continue doing such an excellent job clearing the snow from the roadways, we are asking for your cooperation in not parking your vehicles on the street when prohibited as outlined below.

Bountiful City Parking Ordinance 13-1-103 states:

"It is unlawful for any person who owns or has possession, custody, or control of any vehicle to park or allow to be parked any vehicle or trailer on any street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. during the months of November, December, January, February, and March."

The ordinance also **prohibits parking vehicles on the street when it is actually snowing, or within twelve hours thereafter**. This prohibition does not include Main Street between 500 South and 400 North.

This ordinance assists the street department in keeping the streets plowed during the winter months. It is difficult for the snowplows to keep the streets free of snow if they have to maneuver around vehicles parked on the street. Bountiful also has many residential streets and cul-de-sacs that are impossible to plow if there are vehicles parked on them.

The police department will enforce this ordinance as we have for the past several years. Officers will be putting warnings on vehicles left parked on the street for the first two weeks of November. After that, officers will begin issuing parking citations on all vehicles that are left on the street in violation of this ordinance. After the same vehicle has been issued two parking citations, that vehicle will be impounded at the owner's expense. This includes all cars, trailers, boats, etc.



The police department does not want to issue parking citations or impound vehicles, but we will do so to assist the street department in keeping the streets clear of snow and safe for our community. Please help us by keeping your vehicles off the street when prohibited.
