Bountiful City's Fall Clean Up

Full cleanup is October 9-13. During that week on your regular garbage pickup day, City crews will also remove trash and refuse which has been properly bundled, bagged or boxed in addition to the regular pick up. Limbs and trees must be cut, bundled and **tyed with twine** in five foot lengths. Any bundles, bags or boxes must not exceed 50 pounds. Concrete and construction materials will not be picked up curb side. Items such as old furniture or appliances should be placed on the drive approach or park strip, not on the street or sidewalk. **Please place your items out by 7:00 a.m. on your garbage day.**

Also, to assist you in your cleanup, the landfill will not charge a fee for Bountiful residents during fall cleanup week or the following week (October 16-21)

so trash that does not comply with the above restrictions can be disposed of at no charge. Landfill fees will still be in place for concrete and construction materials during the cleanup weeks. We do not accept propane tanks or tires of any kind at the landfill.

Bountiful Light & Power—Why Solar Pricing has Changed

Bountiful City has owned and operated its own electric utility system since 1935. Today, Bountiful City's 43,000 residents and its commercial customers receive reliable and competitively-priced electricity from Bountiful City Light and Power (BCLP).


Whether an electric utility is private or municipal, it has one over-arching legal obligation to its customers: it is the provider of last resort, and it must be capable of delivering electric power to meet whatever the customer demand is at any time of the day or night, 365 days each year, rain, snow, or shine.

Pricing Solar Power for BCLP Co-Generators

The laws of physics play into the electric power business in one undeniable way: electricity can't be stored in industrial-strength quantities. When someone figures out how to do that, it will revolutionize the electric industry, but science isn't there yet.

Presently, BCLP has 200 customers who have installed solar panels on the roofs of their homes (1% of BCLP's customers). Whether the sun is shining or not, BCLP still remains the electric provider of last resort. The problem for solar customers and BCLP is that their power is mostly generated during a time of the day when it is least needed and, so far, cannot be stored.

Solar customers who obtained solar permits before the end of June 2017 are reimbursed 9.25¢ for every kilowatt hour (KWH) they generate, even though BCLP – at the time the power is generated – can buy it somewhere else for 4¢ per KWH. This turns out to be a good deal for the solar customers, but not so good a deal for the 99% of BCLP customers who have not installed solar. BCLP has been buying power it doesn't need, at a time it can't use it, for 9.25¢ per KWH, and then is required to sell that excess power for 4¢ per KWH, losing money. That makes no sense as a sustainable business model, and it makes no sense for the other 16,600 BCLP residential and commercial customers.



The New Feed-In Tariff: Greater Equity for All Customers

As of July 1, 2017, BCLP began accepting new solar customers based on what is called a "feed-in tariff." This arrangement allows for accurate measurement of power going into a customer's home from BCLP, and power going out of that home to BCLP. The power going into the home is sold at the same price per KWH as it is to all BCLP residential customers. The price paid to the solar customer by BCLP will be based on the time of day the solar customer is generating power. The price paid by BCLP will more closely match the equivalent rate BCLP has to pay for power at those times. It will allow for a more competitive rate during the time of day that it can actually be used by the community, rather than a 200% subsidy at a time when it can't.

Some have argued that the feed-in tariff is an effort by BCLP to prevent solar customers from using "free" solar power. That is misleading. Anyone who wishes to rely exclusively on free solar power to light their home and run an air-conditioner is not required to connect to the BCLP system. However, if a homeowner or business wishes to become, not just a BCLP customer but also a co-generator via solar power, then the obligation of BCLP is to ensure that the arrangement is fair, not only to the solar co-generator, but to all other BCLP customers as well. Paying someone twice as much for something that could otherwise be purchased at half the cost is no way to run a utility.

"Green" Power in Bountiful

Nearly 45% of the power currently provided by BCLP is hydroelectric and 100% carbon-free. Providing clean power and looking to the future has been and continues to be a priority for Bountiful City and BCLP. The City has investigated several renewable projects such as heat recovery, geothermal, and wind projects, but they have not been, so far, economically practicable. BCLP is also in the process of securing a long-term reasonably priced commercially-generated solar power contract. This power resource has a production capacity suited to BCLP's bedroom community load characteristics at a highly competitive price. It is expected to be online in early 2019.
