Handcart Days, recently voted the most popular community event in Davis County, will be held July 22 and 23 this year with the theme of "Pioneer Memories and Vision." Hundreds of volunteers from Bountiful, West Bountiful, and Woods Cross are already committed to making it a success. Dallas and Marjorie Bradford are this year's directors.

The Handcart Days Grand Parade will feature 100 entries, including an anticipated 10 major bands. Last year some 75,000 people were on hand to enjoy the floats, antique vehicles, clowns, and entries. When City Watch Calls, Pay Attention



Public safety agencies in Davis County have access to a new technological tool that can make their jobs easier and your life safer. Named "City Watch" and unofficially known as "Reverse 9-1-1," this software lets public safety officials send a message to all telephones in a designated area.

Instead of dedicating precious time and staff to individually call every home or canvass door-to-door, officials can record a message, and with a single keystroke send it to every telephone in the area. During February's LPG tanker rollover and fire in Kaysville, the incident commander used City Watch to inform neighbors about the accident and provide evacuation instructions. Of the 440 telephones targeted, over 95% were answered.

Your public safety emergency responders are well trained and experienced at making lifeand-death decisions under pressure with limited information. Their highest priority is your own personal safety and that of everyone else who may be affected by an incident. The best thing for you to do is to be prepared by having a 72-hour kit. If you get a call from City Watch, follow the instructions and then monitor news media or report to designated evacuation centers to get updates as they become available.







2005 Bountiful Municipal Elections

Believe it or not, there are elections this year! While state, federal, and county officials are elected on "even" years, by state law all municipal elections are held on "odd" years. Also by state law, these municipal elections are "non-partisan" – candidates are not chosen by any political party, so there are no democrats or republicans. These are part-time positions. In Bountiful, the Mayor and City Council set policy and direction for the city, and the city staff, under the direction of the city manager, implement that policy. All positions are "at-large", meaning that each council position represents all the citizens of Bountiful, rather than a specific geographic area.

This year the office of Mayor and two City Council positions are up for election – seats currently held by Mayor Joe Johnson and councilmembers Fred Moss and Tom Tolman. These positions are four-year terms; in 2007 the other three council seats, presently held by John Pitt, Barbara Holt, and Richard Higginson, will be up for election. This "overlapping

term" provides continuity for the city while allowing citizens the right to select half of their representatives every two years.

Mayor Johnson and Councilmen Moss and Tolman have indicated their intention to run again. They, along with anyone else who wishes to run, must file a "Declaration of Candidacy" in person in the City Recorder's Office between July 15 and August 15. There are four requirements that a candidate must meet in order to run:

- Be a United States citizen.
- **2** Be at least 18 years old by the general election (November 8, 2005).
- 3 Be a legal resident of Bountiful for 12 consecutive months prior to the election.
- 4 Be a registered voter of Bountiful.

The general election will be held Tuesday, November 8. Should a primary election be necessary, it will be held Tuesday, October 4. If you have any questions about the 2005 municipal elections, please feel free to contact Kim Coleman, Bountiful City Recorder, at 298-6115.

- An increase in burial fees at the cemetery to pay for one additional person to assist in the increasing number of weekend burials.
- **5** A 3% cost-of-living adjustment for full-time personnel.
- 6 A decrease in medical benefits to full-time employees by increasing copayments and deductibles for office visits, prescriptions, and other services.

Summer Energy Conservation **Tips**

Most of us are energy conscious and want to conserve where we can. Your efforts, especially during the "peak use" hours of 4-9 p.m., will help us avoid having to buy the more expensive power. Bountiful Power's customers will benefit from energy savings this summer as they practice some of these tips:

Lighting

 Keep bulbs and fixtures clean, since accumulated dust can lower lighting levels.

 Turn off fluorescent lights if you are going to leave a room for more than 10

 Turn incandescent (regular type) lights off when leaving a room.

Use low wattage bulbs or compact fluorescent bulbs in all areas when feasible, especially closets, hallways, and porches.

Laundry

Operate your clothes washer and dryer only with full loads.

· Dry clothes on an outside line whenever possible.

Remove lint from your washer and dryer filters.

Cooling

 Central air conditioning can cost as much as 40 cents per hour.

• Raise your thermostat 2 or 3 degrees and save 1% for each degree raised.

 Set thermostat to higher settings when home will be unoccupied for several hours. Turn it off when leaving on vacation.

 Close curtains or blinds when the sun is shining directly in the windows.

• If it feels cool outside, leave A/C off and open windows (especially in the morning).

New Recreation Center Update

On April 12, an historic groundbreaking took place at the "bubble." The mayors of all the cities of South Davis County, together with Davis County School Superintendent Bryan Bowles, joined forces (and shovels) to break ground on the new \$23 million recreation center. The South Davis Recreation Board awarded a contract to Hogan and Associates Construction to build the facility, and final plans are being reviewed by the architect and contractor, with construction to begin in June. The facility is scheduled to be completed and open for business October 1, 2006.

Until the new facility is completed, the "old" recreation center will be open for business - the "bubble" is coming down this month, and summer swimming lessons and open swim will be enjoyed by all. The ice skating, racquetball, and fitness areas will all be open at the existing center, and the contractor will be required to leave the parking in front of the existing center until it finally closes its doors sometime next August, 2006. At this time it will be demolished, and the space it occupies will become the parking area for the new

This project could not have happened without the participation, support, and leadership of the mayors of South Davis County. I applaud Centerville Mayor Mike Deamer, West Bountiful Mayor Carl Martin, Woods Cross Mayor Jerry Larrabee, and North Salt Lake Mayor Kay Briggs for sharing the vision of what can happen when cities come together. Likewise, I express appreciation to the Davis County School District for partnering with us in building a joint aymnasium that will be used by Bountiful Junior High School during school hours, and by recreation center patrons the rest of the time. This is truly a "winwin" relationship that wisely uses taxpayer resources.

So as you drive past 400 North Park in the next year, glance over and watch as a wonderful 145,000 square foot facility comes out of the ground and takes shape. Use our existing facility this next year, and get ready to move with us into a great new center in October, 2006!

2005-2006 **Budget Highlights**

Bountiful's 2005-06 \$52.8 million budget has been tentatively adopted by the City Council. A public hearing on the budget will be held on June 14, with final adoption by the Council on June 21. The city's fiscal year begins July 1, 2005, by state law, and cities are required to adopt a balanced budget prior to the start of the fiscal year.

The 2005-06 fiscal year budget includes the following:

No increase in property taxes. Bountiful will maintain its position as the lowest property tax rate city of the 30 largest cities in the state.

No increase in water, sewer, garbage, or storm water utility rates.

3 A 6% increase in power rates to offset a 24% increase in power costs from Colorado River Storage Project power purchased! The average cost to the consumer will be \$3 per month based on 800 KWH average usage.
