Just a Reminder-Winter is Still Here!

WINTER PARKING "It is unlawful for any person who owns or has possession, custody, or control of any vehicle to park or allow to be parked any vehicle or trailer on any street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. during the months of November, December, January, February, and March." The ordinance also prohibits parking ve-



hicles on the street when it is actually snowing, or within twelve hours thereafter, except on Main Street between 400 North and 500 South.

SNOW REMOVAL Remove snow from the sidewalks adjacent to your property within 24 hours after a snow storm. (City Ord. §6-2-115). Making sure your sidewalks are clear makes it safer for pedestrians and drivers during the winter months. Do not blow or shovel snow off your driveway or sidewalk into the street. (City Ord. §6-2-115). Do not defeat the efforts of our snow plow drivers by putting snow into the street. It is dangerous!
