MAYOR'S CORNER-A BOUNTIFUL COMMUNITY

hen I think about our community of Bountiful, many things come to my mind. As we have participated in the many local events held in our city over the last few months, I realize how wonderful our citizens are in contributing to a great sense of community here.

I recently googled "what makes a good/ thriving/happy community" and found that there were many things listed-just as I suspected there would be. Some of the ideas included were shared

values, diversity, discussion, protecting each other, good schools, a low crime rate and even shopping! In my opinion, Bountiful has all of these! I'll share my ideas about a about a few.

Our community, with the motto of "The City of Beautiful Homes and Gardens," is very well maintained both by property owners and City employees. Pride in ownership, along with other shared values such as strong families and education. are evident in Bountiful City and add significantly to our sense of community. In a letter I recently received from Dr. W. Bryan

Bowles, superintendant of the Davis School District, he indicated that Davis School District is a "national graduation rate leader" with approximately 90% of high school seniors graduating. There were 1,416 total graduates from the three high schools attended by Bountiful students, and over \$15,000,000 in scholarships were awarded to many of those students. According to Bountiful Police Chief Tom Ross, of the 20 largest cities in Utah, Bountiful has one of the lowest crime rates. Statistics from the year 2012 (the latest available) show that Bountiful's crime rate has been on a downward trend since 2010. Our citizens are our best resources for reporting crime and suspicious activity. We look out for each other and by doing so, help to keep the crime rate low and Bountiful a safe place to live.

If you were able to attend any of our recent summer activities, you will have noticed the diversity in culture, food and creativity that is available in Bountiful. Also, to assist you in your cleanup, the landfill will not charge a fee to the residents of

Bountiful during fall cleanup week or the following week so trash that does not comply with the above

fill fees will still be in place for concrete and construction materials during the cleanup free weeks. We can no longer accept propane tanks or tires of any kind during clean up week or at the landfill.

very home should have a pressure regulating on your home will prevent any damage due to these E very home should have a pressure try valve (PRV) to protect it from flooding due to fluctuations in water pressure. Although the plumbing code has required PRVs on new homes for decades, many older homes do not have them. Making sure your home has one can prevent flood damage to your home.

Water pressure varies in different parts of town and from one time to another. Because Bountiful is built on a hillside, the changes in elevation present challenges to maintaining reasonable operating water pressures, and becomes further complicated with multiple pressure zones throughout the City. In addition, increased water pres-

sure can be the result of a fire hydrant being used by the Fire Department, a contractor filling a tanker truck, an industrial business making a large instantaneous water demand, or one of the City's 240 system pressure regulating valves failing for any reason. These are all normal events that cause water pressure fluctuations, and a properly installed PRV



water pressure changes.

These are a few of the reasons the Uniform Plumbing Code has, for over 40 years, required that every home have a properly working

and maintained PRV. If your home is older and does not have a PRV, we strongly suggest that you install one with the help of a plumber. It is each homeowner's responsibility to install a PRV so their home is protected from damage due to these types of water pressure events. The City does not and cannot guarantee a particular water pressure, and is not liable for damage incurred as a result of normal water

Bees are also now allowed to be kept on

pressure fluctuations or lack of a PRV.

What do Chickens and Bees have in Common?

hey are both now legal in Bounti-I ful! Bountiful Code 14-22-101 allows chickens to be kept on a singlefamily residential lot. A city license is needed for the keeping of up to eight hens (no roosters) which requires filling out a short application and a \$5.00 fee. Stop by the Planning and Zoning offices at City Hall, Monday - Thursday, 7:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. to get your license. All of the requirements can

be found on the web site for Bountiful City/ Departments/Planning & Zoning/Chapter 22 and the application can be found at Bountiful City/ eServices/Online Forms & Docs.



a single-family residential lot in Bountiful. A city license is not required, however beekeepers must comply with the standards found in Bountiful Code Section 8-4-104 and shall be

NEW BUDGET BILLING DATES

ountiful City will be changing billing software in SEPTEM-BER 2014. Due to this change, the Utility Billing department will be accepting new requests for Budget Billing during the month

of AUGUST 2014. The amount of your monthly equalized payment is estimated by averaging the last twelve month's bills. To qualify, a customer must have been at their current address for a minimum of twelve months, be current on payments, and remain current on their payments. The complete terms and conditions are found on the application form, which is available on our website (www.bountifulutah.gov), in person at our office in City Hall (790 South 100 East) or by phone (801.298.6100). Applications must be received in our office by AUGUST 31, 2014.
